On February 26, [Daniela Dahn](#), author, journalist and film maker from Germany, presented her film *Zeitschleifen- Im Dialog mit Christa Wolf* at the Bucerius Institute and the Haifa Center for German and European Studies (HCGES). The film portrays the life and work of Christa Wolf, one of the most prominent German post-war authors. Wolf talks about her motives, hopes, fears and errors in a very personal conversation with Daniela Dahn that asks how and why Wolf lived and worked in the former GDR, both adored and simultaneously met with hostility. The event was organized in cooperation with the Rosa Luxemburg Foundation in Tel Aviv.

On March 5, the Bucerius Institute hosted [Dr. Klaus Hödl](#) from the Center for Jewish Studies of the University of Graz. He gave a lecture on Jewish *Volkssänger* influencing the Viennese popular culture during the period between the world wars. A lively exchange between Dr. Hödl and our audience rounded off the evening.

[Dr. Herbert Lappe](#) from the Jewish Community of Dresden gave a lively and well-visited talk on Jewish life in the former GDR on March 17, 2013. Based on his personal biography, Dr. Lappe spoke about his ambivalent position as Jewish citizen of the GDR. Both a member of the socialist youth organization, and the Jewish community in Dresden, Dr. Lappe illustrated how he attempted, on the one hand, to help the country move forward from inside the official structures, but at the same time used these structures to divert from the path outlined by the party. Dr. Lappe ended his talk with a presentation of the New Dresden Synagogue (2001), that was awarded the prize for best European Architecture in 2001, and that he was instrumental in building.

On March 13, 2013 the [Sixth Annual Bucerius Research Workshop](#) took place and offered a platform to Bucerius scholarship recipients and fellows to present their PhD and M.A. research. The young scholars gave papers on various topics from different disciplines, such as Jewish Studies, Political Sciences and Law. Dr. Morris-Reich, Prof. Fania Oz-Salzberger, Dr. Khalid Ghanayim, and Prof. Gilad Margalit commented on the presentations that were followed by lively and fruitful discussions.
